

It doesn't take long. It's usually only about two or three days after the ice goes off the lake and the loons are back in Temagami. Somehow they know. They will stay all summer and into the fall until just before the ice comes in. When you see the loons leave, you know that easily within a week there will be ice on the

lake.

The Latin term for the Great Northern Loon is "Gavia immer", but it is also known as the Common Loon and they are definitely common to Temagami. We love to see them return year after year.

Loons are very territorial; you will never see two loon nests close

to each other. There will generally be only one pair of loons per bay on a large lake. It would need to be a fairly big lake, or a have a set of narrows, to get more than one pair of loons on the same lake. They don't like seeing each other.

I have heard that loons mate for life; and that they always lay two eggs. By the end of June you will see them with the chicks. You will definitely hear them too. They have several different calls and they can get very loud sometimes. At night, the loon's call sounds like they are warbling – like one is telling the other about something.

Loons actually seem to fly underwater and they can turn on a dime chasing fish. It is amazing how tight of a circle they can turn underwater. They have huge webbed feet and are great swimmers and divers, but cannot walk well on land – they have difficulty because their front end is so heavy, so they tend to nest very close to shore. They are solid birds, very heavy for their size.

Loons are beautiful looking birds and people love to get the chance to photograph them. Whether they are strutting their stuff

> in a show of superiority, giving the chicks a ride on their back, or just taking it easy, they make a great picture. I find the key to photographing loons is to take lots of pictures. It also helps to stay quiet, so minimize movement such as pointing fingers or moving arms around.

Ideally, try not to

have a lot of people or any dogs in the boat. You are generally able to get closer in a low boat, for example a Naden, since loons tend to be very wary of larger boats sitting high out of the water. They get familiar with things though, and are fairly tame around humans if they know you, but on back lakes that don't get much traffic, these birds will be very wary.

In our bay, they are used to us, so I have been able to get quite close. You can get to recognize them as individuals too, since the pattern of that white band around their neck is unique to each loon, like a fingerprint.

Any time of day is good for photographing loons, but make sure the sun is behind you, unless you want a special effect like a silhouette in the sunset. Take the time to compose the photo in your viewfinder if you want a good shot. Keep in mind that positioning the horizon in the top third of the shot suggests closeness and in bottom third suggests distance. I usually suggest trying to capture the bird moving toward the center of the picture.

Try to get your photos in the early summer, since in late summer they moult – the head feathers change color from the beautiful black to a dirty brown. A loon in the fall is not a very attractive bird.

Go ahead and photograph them, but remember to respect them and don't get too close.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT MASTER PLAN

When AECOM presented the revised Solid Waste Management Master Plan to Council in May, it included significant changes to the original recommendations in the draft report. The changes take into consideration public input made through comments at the public meeting in March, written letters and electronic submissions. Council received the Plan as a guide to Council and staff on waste management initiatives over the next 20 years.

There were 14 recommendations included in the final report. Those regarding the two waste transfer stations were addressed by Council at the May 17th regular council meeting, since these were urgent. The remaining recommendations, largely related to the Municipality's three waste disposal sites, will be considered by Council for adoption on an individual basis.

The urgency to deal with the transfer stations is due to the fact that the Ministry of the Environment (MOE) has informed the Municipality recently and repeatedly that the volume and types of material deposited at these sites has not been in conformance with our Certificate of Approvals.

Council adopted the revised recommendation to close the waterfront transfer station beside the Welcome Centre, rather than relocate it and restrict access.

PLEASE NOTE that this transfer station will be CLOSED as of June 25, 2012.

The original proposal to gate and restrict hours for the transfer station (wagons) at the Lake Temagami Access Point was modified following further discussion with the MOE. The area will not be fenced, but an attendant will supervise the disposal of waste for 40 hrs per week during the summer months, when the usage is the heaviest. The Municipality is asking user groups to collectively propose a schedule for those hours. Volunteers from user groups will be asked to oversee the waste disposal in the off season for a few hours a week.

Besides enforcement, the attendant will provide public education on appropriate disposal of waste and recyclables. The Municipality is asking for the cooperation of all lake residents and visitors who use this transfer station to conform to correct usage of this waste disposal site without it being fenced and locked. Please keep in mind that this is an interim approach to see if it will fix the problem. Without your cooperation, if the violations continue, the Municipality will be forced by MOE to take stronger measures.

In addition, the Municipality has improved the garbage docks at the Lake Temagami Access Point and will also be adding a new bin for cardboard recyclables. Construction waste will no longer be accepted at the transfer station and must be taken to the Landfill Site. Tipping Fees for construction waste will also be reinstituted in the near future.

NEW PLANNER

The Municipality welcomes Wayne Koethe to fill the position of Municipal Planner. Wayne was able to quickly put his combination of planning education and work experience

to use in Temagami, as he stepped into some weighty planning matters.

These include working with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing to facilitate their decision on the Official Plan Amendment resulting from the 5-year Review; the accompanying revisions to the Comprehensive Zoning By-law; a significant Plan of Sub-division application by Temagami Bays Estates, and a cost-benefit analysis of the Lot Creation and Development Plan Study on warm water lakes.

In addition to these larger matters, Wayne will be dealing with property owners on day-today planning issues such as Consents, Minor Variances, and Site Plan Control Agreements.

PUBLIC MEETING RE TEMAGAMI BAYS

A Public Meeting will be held on Thursday, June 7th at 5:30pm to hear public input with regard to an application for a Plan of Subdivision and Zoning By-law Amendment for Temagami Bays Estates Development Corporation.

The original applications were submitted in 2006, with the proposed development being for a 53-lot subdivision on their property on Kanichee Mine Road. However, some studies were required and also several changes were



needed to meet both the requirements of the Province and of the Municipality. The developer has now submitted a revised proposal to the Municipality for a total of 23 lots.

Council has determined that due to the changes made and time elapsed, another Statutory Public Meeting should be held under the requirements of the Planning Act. Following that meeting, a final staff Planning Report will be prepared, taking into consideration matters raised through the public consultation process. Upon receipt of the final report, Council will then consider draft conditions of approval.

A pre-meeting planning report on this application is currently available at www.temagami.ca/planning-notices, and a full package on these applications is available for viewing at the municipal office during regular business hours.

OFFICIAL PLAN/ZONING BY-LAW UPDATE

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) has reviewed Temagami's Official Plan amendments that were adopted by Council last fall and submitted to the Ministry for approval. In March, MMAH sent proposed modifications to the Municipality and met with Council on April 5th to discuss them.

Council has concurred with the revisions that were minor in nature and which refined wording without changing the scope of the Plan. Council also agreed with the Ministry's recommendation to expand the "built boundary" in the urban area to show a "settlement area boundary" that includes areas of possible expansion within the urban area, but disagreed with including the potential for more than very limited development on private roads. Council also proposed alternate wording with regard to the potential for crown land disposition within the Municipality.

The resolutions of Council on these matters have been forwarded to MMAH and we anticipate being informed of their decision in the near future. Once their decision is made on the revisions to the Plan, the Ministry will send us a Notice of Decision, which we will post for public viewing. You may also have MMAH notify you directly of their decision by sending a written request to the Ministry.

2012 BUDGET

Council passed By-law 12-1063 on May 17th to adopt the Municipal Operating and Capital Budget for 2012. The by-law sets the municipal residential tax rate at 0.00714152, which is down from the 2011 rate of 0.00763618. With the assessment increases, the dollars raised through taxes are up 3.9% from last year, which is less than the decrease of 4.1% last year. Over the two years the net change in total taxes budgeted is a decrease of 0.2%. Those properties on municipal water and sewer and those with garbage pick-up will see a small increase in user fees on this year's bill.

Council does realize that due to disproportionate increases in MPAC assessments, the impact of the budget will affect properties differently. Those who saw a substantial increase in their current value assessment, will again see an increase in their property taxes this year. Council has attempted to mitigate this as much as possible through controlling costs. Since 2012 is the last year in the current 4-year assessment cycle, we are hopeful that the next cycle will not bring such drastic increases, but rather level off.

MAYOR FIGHTS FOR LOCAL SCHOOL

Despite the refusal of the District School Board Ontario North East (DSBONE) to hear a delegation from Mayor Hodgson at the May 22, 2012 Board meeting, they will certainly be hearing more from Temagami and from other municipalities in this district who are experiencing similar treatment of their local schools. Mayor Hodgson made a presentation to the school board on May 8th, but to no avail. At that meeting they gave notice of motion for the May 22nd meeting to move grades 7 and 8 out of Temagami Public School this September.

That means that these students will be put on the bus for a daily 140 kilometre round trip to New Liskeard Public School. Additionally, Council is certain that this will set the stage for the closure of the school in the near future, due to "lack of enrolment".

Annoyed that the School Board is making these important decisions without any form of consultation with parents and municipal leaders, and contrary to professional protocol, the Mayor has sent letters directly to the provincial Minister of Education. Municipalities are required by the province to collect school taxes on property tax bills, at a set rate of the assessed value. Temagami pays DSBONE about one million dollars annually regardless of the number of students we have in the school, or even if we have a local school. Council is adamant that keeping our local elementary school open is something that is definitely worth fighting for.

As usual, the community of Marten River will be a busy place this summer, but never too busy to share some fun with friends and visitors. The Marten River Volunteer Firefighters Association (MRVFA) will be hosting their three customary events this year and invite all to joint them.

On Sunday, July 1st there will be an "All You Can Eat" pancakes and more breakfast from 8-11am. The cost is \$7.00 for adults and \$5.00 for children aged 5-12. Children under 5 eat for free.

On Sunday, July 15th, MRVFA will host the 11th Annual Pork Barbecue, which will be served from 5-7pm. The cost for this sumptuous meal is \$12.00 for adults & \$6.00 for children aged 5-12.

Sunday August 5th is the Community Yard And Bake Sale from 7:30am -12:30pm. FIRE SEASON CAUTION

The early hot, dry weather this year sparked a number of forest fires in the region. By mid-May the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) had designated the area as a Restricted Fire Zone (RFZ) and had caused the green and orange notices to be posed throughout the community.

During a RFZ no open fires, including campfires, are permitted (although portable gas or propane stoves are allowed if at least 1 metre from any flammable materials and you use extreme caution). During the accompanying municipal "fire ban", all municipally issued burning permits are suspended.

At the time of writing of this update, both the RFZ and fire ban are still in place. We anticipate that these restrictions will continue to be effective until sufficient rainfall has occurred to

reduce the fire hazard rating. In the meantime, please exercise extreme caution with any kind of flame, including your barbeque.

Information on fire restrictions are posted on the main page of our website at www.temagami.ca and included in Public Notices. If you are unsure if a fire restriction is still in place, please check the website, or contact the Municipal Office. Let us all be vigilant and help protect the beautiful forests around us from the damage of forest fires.

ONTARIO NORTHLAND DIVESTITURE

As part of the 2012 provincial budget cuts, the Province has decided to wind down the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission (ONTC). When the announcement was made in March 2012, a transition board had already been appointed to implement this decision.

The province stated in March that there would be no immediate changes for ONTC services or employees. To date we have not been given any further details about timing, but we have been advised that there will be no Dreamcatcher excursions this fall. This will have an impact on local businesses. At some point ONTC will also be replacing the regular passenger train service with bus service.

Ontera, the communications division of ONTC, is the provider of telephone and internet service in Temagami. Ontera is included in the plans for divestiture, with the intention to sell the assets to another provider, so we can anticipate changes to these services in the future, but at this time it is uncertain what those changes will be. There may also be a potential for local job losses for ONTC and Ontera employees, but we do not know to what extent.

Despite objections from Temagami and other affected northern Municipalities and ONTC employees, there is no indication that the province will reconsider this move.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

It is good to see new businesses opening in Temagami. Our municipal Economic Development Officer is pleased to provide information that will assist new business owners with starting a business or help existing businesses to grow. The Economic Development Office also maintains a list of business and commercial properties for sale or lease in Temagami.

We also recognize that sometimes a small business must close or move away for personal reasons. So if you are thinking of selling or leasing your business, we encourage you to forward your information the Economic Development Office to promote the business opportunity.


For those of you either arriving late or are later in getting started, she offers a Pre-selection and ordering service. You can choose what you would like through e-mailed pictures and she

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A Pleasure Craft Courtesy Check is a free voluntary service provided by the Canadian Power Squadron and Transport Canada to assist you in maintaining your vessel's safety equipment.

A trained Transport Canada volunteer will board your vessel, at your invitation only, and conduct a thorough check of all the safety equipment required to be carried on board. The Check includes making sure the equipment is present and in good working condition. As well a check of optional safety and navigational equipment will be carried out. The volunteer will also discuss general safety awareness and safe boating practices.

A Pleasure Craft Courtesy Check can take from 15 to 30 minutes.

Upon successful completion of the Check, a decal will be issued, which should be displayed on the vessel. Some boaters worry that they will not successfully complete the Check. You should not

be concerned about this. The volunteer will offer suggestions that can assist you in remedying any deficiencies.

The information obtained during a Pleasure Craft Courtesy Check will not be forwarded to any enforcement agency and is protected by the Privacy Act. A Pleasure Craft Courtesy Check is not mandatory or required by law.

BOOK REVIEW

I just finished reading the national best seller, Cascadia's Fault: The Deadliest Earthquake That Will Devastate North America by Jerry Thompson. I found it to be very informative, fascinating and worrisome. After reading the book I did some quick research about earthquakes in Northern Ontario. On the Natural Resource Canada website (www.nrcan.gc.ca), I learned that in Northern Ontario we have a very low level of seismic activity. From 1970 to 1999 on average, only 1 or 2 magnitude 2.5 or greater earthquakes were recorded for this area. However, a magnitude 5 earthquake occurred in 1928 northwest of Kapuskasing and in 1935 the area of Temiscaming was shaken by a 6.2 magnitude earthquake. To me these last two numbers are not low.

Now in addition to fears of such emergencies as forest fires, flooding and severe winter storms one could add earthquakes. Are we prepared for such an event? In the book, Cascadia's Fault, only the communities who were informed and regularly practiced emergency measures/procedures were the ones who had the least causality.

I was told that the Municipality of Temagami does have an emergency plan and if warnings/information were to be given to the public they will call us we are not to tie up phone lines and call the Municipality. Perhaps a public

information session that covers such possibilities would be helpful.

The following is a book description by HarperCollins Canada.

"The Cascadia Subduction Zone is a crack in the earth's crust, roughly fifty kilometres offshore, running 1,100 kilometres from northern Vancouver Island to northern California. About every 500 years this fault generates a monster earthquake. There is roughly a thirty percent chance that it could happen again within the next fifty years. Or it could happen tonight. Without a doubt, the coming quake is one day closer today than it was yesterday.

The Cascadia Subduction Zone is virtually identical to the offshore fault that wrecked Sumatra in 2004, and it will generate the same type of earthquake, a magnitude nine or higher. It will send crippling shockwaves across a far wider area than any of the California quakes you've ever heard about, slamming five cities at the same time: Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle, Portland and Sacramento. Cascadia's fault will wreck dozens of smaller towns and coastal villages -- and no one in these places will be able to call their neighbours for help.

Written by a journalist who has been following this story for twenty-five years, Cascadia's Fault tells the tale of this devastating future earthquake and the tsunamis it will spawn

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Bleach Bottles and Floating Cans:

What you should know about private buoys and hazard markers

The red and green channel markers m a i n t a i n e d by the Town of Temagami safely guide us around the Lake. Com-

bined with a shoal map, they should keep most boaters away from shoals and other hazards, and save us a lot of money for engine repairs.

Private buoys, such as the common "No Wake" Buoys, are legal, as are bottles used to mark hazards. Any person may place a private buoy that meets Transport Canada regulations. No permit is needed. For further information, go to the Transport Canada web site at www.tc.gc.ca/actsregulations/ for the Canada Shipping Act 2001, Private Buoy Regulations SOR/99-335.

A booklet containing the regulations and information about how to build your own private buoys is also available - "An Owner's Guide to Private Aids to Navigation," available from the Navigable Waters Protection Branch of Transport Canada at 519 383 1826. I asked Kelly Thomson of the Navigable Waters Protection Branch (NWPB) about the commonly used white bleach bottle. She said that NWPB prefers people use a yellow plastic bottle or empty sealed pail that meets the regulation size of 15.25 cm wide by 30.5 cm high (5 inches x 12 inches). White should be reserved to mark swimming areas.

If you are concerned about the location of a private buoy placed by someone else, speak to them, as we are all concerned about safety and the marking of shoals and other hazards.

If you cannot reach a resolution of your concerns, Kelly Thomson said that any complaints about private buoys should be made to the Parry Sound office of the Navigable Waters Protection Branch at 705 774 9095.




cream brought in by the boat, Aubrey Cosens. Early morning and late night swims, cookouts on the front porch,

She will be lovingly remembered each summer when her children and grandchildren visit the island.



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
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Magic of Temagami and Safety on Ice

For many of us a visit to Temagami starts with the long drive North. This winter our mid-February trip went smoothly with good road conditions, although car tracks past a jack-knifed tractor-trailer was a reminder that there can be uncertainty on the route.

The Saturday weather was calm and sunny, but frosty; the Lake ice was uneven from earlier thaws. We followed the usual ploughed winter road from Manitou to Bear Island, but it was surprising to meet a sign off the south side of Bear Island rerouting traffic; see Picture 1.

The sign was seemingly for cars and heavy traffic, but

there can of course be pressure cracks and other things of concern for snowmobiles, so it did seem prudent to follow the arrow and take the spur road to Bear Is-

land. So we started up to the right towards the island. I was with Nancy on the lead snowmobile, with a small rigid hitch sleigh loaded with groceries for a week's visit; my daughter Andrea and a friend were on the second snowmobile following behind. Both machines had studs and were super secure on the ice, now glassy smooth.

I was pondering whether to go over the Island or along the shore when out of nowhere there was a sudden and large impact. I was aware of my hel-

met crashing the ice but no understanding of why or what or where. The snowmobile was on its left side and we were both lying on the ice trying to extract ourselves.

Andrea was following slowly behind with her friend and saw it all evolving.

To her disbelief a white Ford Explorer type vehicle with

a red light flashing passed her on the right at high speed, heading on the spur road to Bear Island -- in apparent hot pursuit. But Andrea could see that the vehicle was headed straight for us; that it braked, skidded side ways, sideswiped us and then caromed off to the right to get stuck in the snow bank on the right side of the spur road as you can see in the track marks in Picture 2.

The fast moving vehicle turned out to be an Ontario Provincial Police Cruiser from the Bear Island detachment. The officer was shaken, and wanted to call paramedics, or

> an ambulance from North Bay, or an air ambulance from Sudbury. None of these fit my sense of how to spend winter magic time on Lake Temagami in my winter break!

We were both badly bruised and it turned out I had pelvic fractures, but bones don't heal faster in an ORNGE air ambulance. Our cabin was already warmed, and clearly the place for needed therapy for any fracture. I explained to

the officer that I was going to my home just to the West of Bear Island, although he didn't recognize the local place names I mentioned; he was, it turned out, from a different reserve and didn't know the Lake.

And didn't know what rubber tires on a fast vehicle were like on glaze ice?

Of course leaving the scene of an accident is never wise, but the circumstances were far from the usual, the wind was cold, and it was clear that the wait for the OPP would be long (it turned out to be nearly 4 hours). Warmth and healing comfort overrode the clear 'political' risks.

While the physical discomfort for the week on the Lake was quite unreal, (I wouldn't be able to stand comfortably for two months) at least we were in Temagami; I could drive the snowmobile, although not walk; the week was pleasant. There was of course the visit next day from the OPP to describe events. The snowmobile was un-damaged; al-

though there turned out to be clear tire markings of the impact on the right side, see Picture 3. These show that the impact had lifted the snowmobile up,

with the top of the tire making a nearly horizontal mark before the snowmobile fell to the left.

The magic of course was that we felt lucky to be alive, after being rear-ended and sideswiped by a heavy highway vehicle on rubber on the glaze ice road. And the driver as an OPP was already in an uncomfortable position. But clearly leaving the scene had its risks for us too – we were astonished a week later to receive a rather delicately announced call from the OPP saying that we would receive \$300 ticket for carelessness! The report stated that the police cruiser was going 5 km/h, which is hard to picture given the results of the impact. But we had acknowledged the risks of not staying at the scene.

We paid the ticket; not keen to spend a few days in court in Haileybury, but couldn't help thinking that, as one often hears about in big cities, cops have an interest in helping their own.

In spite of all, ice in the winter in Temagami is very special, and you wouldn't normally factor in a rough encounter with a highway vehicle when peacefully snowmobiling on a Saturday afternoon. With more than 80 summers and 60 winters on the lake, it will take more than that to discourage me from enjoying the magic of a winter visit!
